

**SPECIAL COORDINATION PROCEDURE  
FOR THE USE OF 901.225/940.225 MHz  
FOR NARROWBAND PCS SYSTEMS**

Recognizing that the priority use of frequencies 901.225/940.225 MHz for Narrowband PCS operations, pursuant to the *Interim Sharing Arrangement for the Bands 901-902 MHz, 930-931 MHz and 940-941 MHz* between the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and Industry Canada (hereafter referred to as the Agencies), remains with the United States;

Considering that Skytel Corp.(Skytel) in the United States and DATATRIL Inc. in Canada have been granted authority to use these frequencies on a nationwide basis in their respective countries; and

Considering that both Agencies have agreed in principle to the arrangement between Skytel and DATATRIL;


It is AGREED that:

Industry Canada may authorize the use of frequency pair 901.225/940.225 MHz between Line B and the Canada/U.S. border (hereinafter "the coordination zone"), to the Canadian licensee that has nationwide authority for use of that channel, *provided that* the following conditions are placed on such authorizations:

- stations established under this special procedure will respect the technical criteria as outlined in the *Interim Sharing Arrangement for the Bands 901-902 MHz, 930-931 MHz and 940-941 MHz*;
- agreement will be reached between the Canadian and U.S. licensees for each proposed Canadian station within the coordination zone before it is placed in operation;
- the U.S. licensee has priority use of the subject frequencies within the border area and use of that channel by the Canadian licensee within the coordination zone must not adversely affect any U.S. operations;
- no service may be offered by the Canadian licensee within the U.S. and, no service may be offered by the U.S. licensee within Canada;
- any changes to the notified business arrangement will require review by the Agencies; and,
- in the event of any harmful interference from Canadian operations within the coordination zone to U.S. operations on this channel, the Canadian licensee would take immediate action to resolve the situation.

For any reason whatsoever, this procedure may subject to unconditional withdrawal by either Agency giving three months written notice.

This procedure is accepted as an understanding between the Federal Communications Commission and Industry Canada and will become effective on the date of signature by representatives of both Agencies.
