Welcome Remarks and Introduction of the Keynote Speaker

Susan Au Allen, National President and CEO, USPAACC, Vice Chair, CEDC



Susan Au Allen came to the United States from Hong Kong on an invitation from the White House in recognition of her volunteer work for people with disabilities. She received her Juris Doctor from the Antioch School of Law and LL.M. in International Law from Georgetown University. During her 17 years with Paul Shearman Allen & Associates of Washington, DC and Hong Kong, she became nationally recognized for her work on immigration, international trade and investment. Upon receiving her law degree in 1984, Susan founded the US Pan Asian American Chamber of Education Foundation (USPAACC) with a group of business and civic leaders in Washington, DC and California, to bring the diverse Pan Asian American business and professional people together as one unified voice in business, commerce and trade. In 2001, she won two Federal cases for her small business clients, took sabbatical leave from her law practice, and became USPAACC National President & CEO. At USPAACC, Susan found her true calling in helping immigrants and new American citizens pursue their American Dreams through entrepreneurship and remained at USPAACC. Since then, she has changed the national landscape of minority business to the mainstream market place.

Susan serves a Vice Chair of the Federal Communications Commission's Equity and Diversity Council. In October 2021, under her leadership, USPAACC became one of eight national Tier 1 grantees of the \$100-Million Community Navigator Pilot Program administered by the U.S. Small Business Administration. Together with 43 regional Tier 2 and Tier 3 grantees, USPAACC helped America's small businesses hardest-hit by Covid-19 to retool, readjust, upscale, and grow.

Susan loves music, enjoys reading and dancing, and has served on the Kennedy Center Community Advisory Board for more than 10 years.

Susan also speaks Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin) and writes Chinese fluently.

Keynote Remarks

Mignon Clyburn

Former Acting Chairwoman, Federal Communications Commission



Mignon L. Clyburn served as Commissioner on the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) from 2009 to 2018 and acting chair from May to November of 2013. During her nearly nine years at the FCC, Commissioner Clyburn was committed to closing persistent digital and opportunity divides that continue to challenge rural, Native and low wealth communities. Specifically, she pushed for the modernization of the agency's Lifeline Program, which assists low-income consumers in defraying the cost of voice and broadband service, championed diversity in media ownership, initiated Inmate Calling Services reforms, emphasized diversity and inclusion in STEM opportunities, and fought to preserve a free and open internet. Previously, Clyburn served 11 years on the South Carolina Public Service Commission. Prior to that, she was the publisher and general manager of the Coastal Times, a family-founded, Charleston-based weekly newspaper focusing on issues affecting the African American community. She is currently the principal of MLC Strategies, LLC. Clyburn is a graduate of the University of South Carolina and holds a BS in banking, finance and economics.

Angela Thi Bennett, Esq., MBA Digital Equity Program Director U.S. Department of Commerce, NTIA



Angela Thi Bennett, a new addition to NTIA's growing team, will direct the allocation of the \$2.75 billion Digital Equity Program and help develop guidelines for states to strategically utilize these funds to have a transformative impact in their communities. Angela said of her new role, "As my ability to serve scales to the national level, I remain steadfastly committed to amplifying marginalized voices, empowering local communities to drive solutions, and creating shared standards of metrics to inform interventions and create accountability."

Throughout her career, Angela has focused on community work and improving the quality of life in her Cleveland and greater Ohio communities. Her vast community and public sector experience include leading East Cleveland's department of community and economic development, serving as Superintendent of a community school in Cleveland, and the Ohio State Board of Education. In her previous work at a community-based internet service provider, she was instrumental in growing the customer base and helping over 1,500 individuals benefit from affordable digital access during the height of the pandemic. Angela is an advocate and ambassador for equity and inclusion, using her network and voice to elicit social change.

Rashann Duvall Assistant Division Chief Wireline Competition Bureau Telecommunications Access Policy Division





Rashann serves on the FCC's Digital Discrimination Task Force and has also served as the Co-Deputy Designated Federal Officer for the FCC's Communications Equity and Diversity Council. While at the FCC, Rashann led the Connected Care Pilot Program and Round 1 of the FCC's COVID-19 Telehealth Program, and has also been a senior team member on the Lifeline team. Prior to joining the FCC, Rashann was an assistant general counsel with the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC). She has also worked in private practice. Rashann received her undergraduate degree from Yale University, and her law degree from Harvard Law School.

Sally Doty, Director Mississippi Broadband Office



Sally Burchfield Doty was named by Governor Tate Reeves as the first director of the Office of Broadband Expansion and Accessibility of Mississippi (BEAM). The new office serves as the single point of contact for broadband policy, grant funding, and administration for the State of Mississippi. Sally most recently served as the Executive Director of the Mississippi Public Utilities Staff where she led a team of attorneys and accountants in reviewing and making recommendations on all filings before the Public Service Commission. Her team also administered \$75 million in CARES Act funding for broadband expansion and secured an additional \$32 million of federal funding for unserved areas. Prior to her service in the executive branch, Sally was elected to serve three terms in the Mississippi Senate representing Southwest Mississippi. In the legislature, Sally served as Chair of Judiciary A, Vice-Chair of Finance, and served on the Joint Legislative Budget Committee. In 2019, as Chair of the Energy Committee, Sally shepherded the bill allowing Mississippi Electric Cooperatives to enter the broadband business. An attorney, Sally has practiced law in Jackson and her hometown of Brookhaven. She received her law degree from Mississippi College School of Law and her undergraduate degree from Mississippi University for Women. Sally is adjusting to life as an empty nester and is looking forward to her first grandchild due in November.

John Horrigan Senior Fellow, Benton Institute on Broadband & Society



John B. Horrigan is Senior Fellow at the Benton Institute on Broadband & Society, with a focus on technology adoption and digital inclusion. Horrigan has served as an Associate Director for Research at the Pew Research Center and Senior Fellow at the Technology Policy Institute. During the Obama Administration, Horrigan was part the leadership team at the Federal Communications Commission for the development of the National Broadband Plan (NBP). For the NBP, Horrigan was responsible for the plan's recommendations on broadband adoption.

Horrigan has a Ph.D. in public policy from the University of Texas at Austin and his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia.

Katherine Keegan Director, Office of the Future of Work Colorado Department of Labor & Employment



Katherine began her career working with immigrants and refugees in Boston. This work led her to pursue a master's of science in social work at The University of Texas at Austin. Since then, Katherine has managed AmeriCorps, workforce readiness, and career coaching development programs in Texas, Indiana, and Colorado. In August 2019, she joined the Colorado Department of Labor & Employment as the Director of the Office of the Future of Work leading the state's efforts to raise awareness about the future of work, build digital equity, and through the State Apprenticeship Agency, expand access to registered apprenticeship programs.

Angela Siefer Executive Director, National Digital Inclusion Alliance



Angela Siefer is the executive director of the National Digital Inclusion Alliance. Angela has been working in the field we now call digital inclusion since 1997. From physically setting up computer labs in underserved areas and managing local digital inclusion programs to consulting for the US Department of Commerce and testifying before Congress, Angela develops national strategies and solutions from the ground up. In 2015, Angela helped found the National Digital Inclusion Alliance, a unified voice for home broadband access, public broadband access, personal devices, and local technology training and support programs. Angela serves on the Board of Directors of the Schools, Health, & Libraries Broadband Coalition. Government Technology Magazine named Angela one of their Top 25 Doers, Dreams, and Drivers of 2019, and in 2021, the UCC Media Justice Ministry awarded her the Parker Award.

He started his career with the House Telecom & Finance Subcommittee in the mid 80s and went on to co-found 3 companies and 1 nonprofit, including one of the first telcos (BetterWorld Technology) focused on social and environmental impact and a founding B Corp company. Matthew is a member of the FCC Communications Equity and Diversity Council and leads Connected Communities @ WRC (<u>https://www.wrc-us.org/</u>), with a mission to bring digital workforce development via DigitalBridge Hubs, entrepreneurship and advanced technologies to rural and underserved communities nationwide.

Dr. Dianne Lynch, President Stephens College Subject Matter Expert, Innovation and Access Working Group, CEDC



Dr. Dianne Lynch became the 24th president of Stephens College in June, 2009. Under her leadership, the College has developed a strategic focus on the creative and performing arts and the health sciences, earning national honors since 2019 in recognition of its communication design/student publications, performing arts and undergraduate research.

Dr. Lynch earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in mass communication and feminist history, and her Ph.D. in Art History and Communications from McGill University in Montreal, Canada. Her research focuses on the social identity development of digital natives – children growing up in online environments.

Prior to coming to Stephens in 2009, Dr. Lynch served as Dean of the Roy H. Park School of Communications at Ithaca College, and as a faculty member and chair of the Department of Journalism at Saint Michael's College in Burlington, Vt. She was also the founding executive director of the national Online News Association (ONA); the editorial director of the first national study of the credibility of online news; the editor of the first textbook on the ethics of digital news; and the inaugural recipient of the ONA's Rich Jaroslovsky Founder Award for contributions to digital journalism. She wrote a biweekly column about women and technology for ABCNews.com, and a weekly column on new media ethics for the *Christian Science Monitor*; was a longstanding member of the Journalism Advisory Board of the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation; and an inaugural member of the panel of judges for the Knight Foundation's News Challenge Awards competition. Dr. Lynch's national study of the future of American journalism and journalism education was commissioned by Knight.

Dr. Lynch was the 2019 recipient of the Mid-Missouri NAACP Distinguished Service Award. She was selected as among the 50 Missouri Top Influencers by the *Kansas City Star*, which sought perspective

and opinions from the group weekly prior to the 2018 midterm elections. In 2017 she was named by the *Columbia Business Times* as one of the ten most influential women in Columbia, Missouri. In 2016, she was the recipient of the Athena Leadership Award, presented annually in recognition of exceptional community service and career achievement.

Dr. Lynch serves on the Boards of Providence Bank, Boone Hospital Center, and the Lillian Kopenhaver Center for Women's Leadership at Florida International University, among others. She is a member of the Executive Committee of the American Midwest athletics conference, for which she served as president from 2012-2018.

Dr. Lynch is married to Philip Coleman. They have four children: Andrew, Amelia, Nick, and Annie.

Leticia Latino-Van Spluteren, CEO Neptuno USA Innovation and Access Working Group Member, CEDC



With over 25 years of experience in the Telecom Industry Leticia Latino went from working for Merrill Lynch and Telecom Giant Nortel Networks to accepting the challenge of extending the legacy of establishing her family business in the US back in 2002. Neptuno Group was originally founded by her father in 1972 in South America where they helped deploy some of the first Cellular Networks in the region and where they have built over 10,000 Towers.

Leticia is a recipient of several industry recognition awards such as 'Revolutionary CEO", "Smart Disruptor" and has been named as one of the 30 most influential Leaders in Tech. Susan Corbett, Founder National Digital Equity Center Innovation and Access Working Group Member, CEDC



Ms. Corbett is a preeminent authority and advocate for digital equity and digital inclusion, and works closely with economic development and rural organizations to promote broadband adoption.

In the fall of 2017, Ms. Corbett founded and launched the **National Digital Equity Center**, collaborating with local and global change makers, relentlessly driving disruptive strategies to close the digital divide in Maine and across the United States. Ms. Corbett is the Executive Director of the National Digital Equity Center.

Ms. Corbett is the former Chief Executive Officer of **Axiom Technologies**, a provider and advocate of fast, affordable, and reliable broadband services for rural communities. In 2005, Ms. Corbett joined Axiom Technologies as Chief Financial Officer. Under her leadership, the telecommunications company designed and constructed more than 100 access points connecting more than 2,500 square miles in one of America's roughest terrains — rural Maine. She has written and managed numerous grants for broadband development and adoption.

Ms. Corbett is a public speaker, educator, and advocate who is dedicated to providing broadband access, digital equity and digital inclusion to rural communities everywhere.

Dr. Jon P. Gant Professor and Dean, School of Library and Information Sciences North Carolina Central University Subject Matter Expert, Digital Empowerment and Inclusion Working Group, CEDC



Dr. Jon Gant is a leader in higher education who helps to make information and digital technologies accessible for everyone. Jon has led ground-breaking research with his colleagues that continues to help communities bridge the digital divide and improve access to the Internet. Jon's research helped advance the digital transformation of public sector organizations and examine the future of work and information technology in manufacturing. Jon and his colleagues from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill recently received a grant from the National Institutes of Health to support the Nutrition for Precision Health study to develop approaches for using artificial intelligence to improve health outcomes from more effective dietary routines. Jon served as the founding director of the Center for Digital Inclusion (CDI) at the School of Information at the University of Illinois. While leading CDI, Jon and his colleagues received funding from the Broadband Technology Opportunity Program to start up a university led public-private partnership that deployed a gigabit fiber network designed to serve households and business in Champaign and Urbana, IL. Jon led the strategy to connect underserved households located in internet deserts within the community. Jon led the CDI team to develop technical assistance models to help community anchor institutions worldwide use digital navigator models to scale up digital literacy training to over 17,000 people.

Using the lessons learned from these experiences, Jon is keenly focused on improving access to the digital skills and competencies of individuals needed to meeting emerging workforce and educational needs in our society. Currently, as dean of the School of Library and Information Sciences at North Carolina Central University, Jon leads the only accredited graduate program in the information field offered by a historically Black college and university in the US. Jon has helped to double its enrollment to over 330 graduate students while working nationally to advance how graduate programs in the information and library science field meet critically-needed digital skills and competencies in today's workforce and research enterprises.

Jon has also utilized this experience to serve on several advisory boards to make recommendations to the National Science Foundation, Federal Communication Commission, and the Institute of Museum and Library Services to address the digital divide and broadband adoption. Jon was recently appointed to the

Federal Communication Commission's Communication Equity and Diversity Council to examine critical diversity and equity issues across the tech sector. Jon serves on the Kettering Foundation's National Issues Forum Board of Directors. Jon was formerly the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Telecommunication Policy Research Conference (TPRC). Jon research and public engagement is funded through NIH, NSF, NTIA, IBM, State Farm Insurance, IMLS, OECD, ITU, among other organizations.

Jon received his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Carnegie Mellon University where he trained in public policy and management. Jon earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Michigan. He has held faculty positions in information systems and public administration previously at the University of Illinois, Syracuse University, and Indiana University.

Kari Harsel Gray (she/her) Digital Equity Program Director Community Tech Network



Ms. Gray has organized local, statewide, and national community-based education and resource events and programs for nonprofits, government agencies, and foundations. Kari currently oversees CTN's inperson and virtual Digital Literacy training programs funded by the California Public Utilities Commission, the California Department of Aging, and the City and County of San Francisco. CTN is an active member of the National Digital Inclusion Alliance and serves on several working groups. Prior to working with CTN, she has worked with the Earth Day Network to support local environmental organizers, the Ford Foundation to organize the first California statewide Wireless Summit, and the California Emerging Technology Fund to organize Computer Help Days throughout California and promote affordable Internet service programs. Dr. Harold Trulear, Associate Professor of Applied Theology Howard University School of Divinity National Director, Healing Communities




